

### KEY PUBLICLY-FUNDED PROGRAMS IN VIRGINIA


The five key publicly-funded early childhood programs are:

- Virginia Preschool Initiative (VPI)
- Mixed Delivery Preschool Grant Program
- Child Care Subsidy Program (CCSP or "Subsidy")
- Head Start and Early Head Start
- Early Childhood Special Education (IDEA Part B, Section 619)
  - Children with special needs can, and should, be enrolled in all publicly funded ECCE programs

Ages served	Children ages 6 weeks through 12 years old

Settings	Child care centers and family day homes
Duration	Families are approved for care based on parents' school or work schedule  Care may be full-day/full-year or wrap around another program

Family eligibility characteristics	Child has a disability that causes an adverse educational impact     Child has an Individualized Education Program (IEP)
Settings	School Divisions     May be served anywhere; special education is a service, not a place (VPI, Head Start, Title 1, Mixed Delivery, community-based)
Duration	School day (varies based on the services written in the IEP) Services are typically provided for the school year Some children may be eligible for extended school year

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**Coordination Amongst Programs** 

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#### MAXIMIZING FUNDS TO MEET FAMILY NEEDS AND **PREFERENCES**

Many parents and caregivers need full-day, full-year care in order to work and support their families.

Publicly-funded programs can work together to meet that need while honoring families' preferences.

- · Here is what Virginia is doing...

  - Here is what virginia is doing...

     Coordinating/expanding eligibility

     Increasing per-child rates

     Wraparound models in Mixed Delivery and Subsidy

     Provider-friendly policies in Subsidy (e.g., paid closure days)

#### MIXED DELIVERY WRAP-AROUND FOR VPI AND HEAD START

New this year, VECF Mixed Delivery can provide "wrap-around" funding for VPI slots and Head Start slots served in community provider settings.

- This enables a VPI student served in a community provider setting to receive continuous care and learning, full day and full year.

  • Wrap-around services make up the difference between full day, full year care (2400 hours)
- and the hours provided by VPI (990 hours)

  Mixed Delivery programs will receive partial Mixed Delivery funding is available for wraparound services
- Full Rate (VPI Rate + Community Provider Add On)
   Wrap-around Mixed Delivery would include at least:
   3.5 hours of additional care on school days

  - 10 hours of care on non-school days 240 total days a year

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#### CHILD CARE SUBSIDY PROGRAM AS WRAP-AROUND

Families who qualify may also be able to receive full day, full year care through the Child Care Subsidy Program (CCSP).

In order to support this, divisions can:

- Coordinate with local DSS agencies to support families in registering for child care subsidy.
- Most families who qualify for VPI will qualify for subsidy
- Depending on the families situation they can be approved for hours outside the school day/year to support wrap-around services

  Work with local childcare providers who accept subsidy to
- provide transportation to/from the VPI site during the school year.

Provide families with local providers who accept subsidy

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#### COORDINATED ENROLLMENT

 $Coordinated\ Enrollment\ is\ the\ process\ where\ all\ early\ childhood\ programs\ in\ a\ community\ work\ together\ to\ enroll\ families.\ Benefits\ of\ this\ process\ are:$ 

#### Families Single point of entry.

#### Providers

- Families are given information on all programs they qualify for, allowing them

to make an educated care decision.

- Workload of enrollment is shared by all providers. Programs can reach more families to
- improve overall enrollment

Coordinated enrollment has the potential to serve more kids while also reducing burden and stress on families and birth-five providers.

With Ready Regions operating statewide, every locality in Virginia should be participating in Coordinated Enrollment planning in 2023/24.

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Virginia communities should coordinate enrollment strategies across all early childhood programs, enabling families to access the early childhood option of their choice and help prepare their children for school.

- State law charges local communities with implementing coordinated approaches to enroll children and leverage funding opportunities across all programs.
- Coordinating across Head Start, Virginia Preschool Initiative (VPI), and Mixed Delivery options is critical to ensuring that all children have the opportunity to start school ready.

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#### OPPORTUNITIES TO BLEND AND BRAID FUNDS

- · Communities may have all, some, or none of these programs
- $\bullet$  Title 1 funds can be used to supplement VPI programs rather than explicitly fund students
- $\bullet$  Community based programs can accept VPI, Mixed Delivery, Head Start and Subsidy.
  - No one student can be fully funded by more than one program
    - 。 Subsidy or Mixed Delivery can be used to provide wrap-around for VPI
  - Students with differing funding sources can be in the same classroom
- All school divisions must serve preschool children with IEPs
- Children with IEPs can be served in any classroom, including community-based programs
  - VPI has a 10% target
  - Head Start has a 10% requirement
